Staff Retention

Staff retention at Nunawading Christian College Secondary is high, with minimal staffing changes from year to year. There was one leave replacement and one new position in 2022. The shared passion, and commitment to students and the school remain very high, facilitating stability, efficient planning and implementation of long term goals, and whole staff professional development.

Expenditure and Teacher Participation in Professional Learning

Staff at Nunawading Christian College Secondary are lifelong learners. Professional development is a priority for all staff in both a formal and informal context.

In 2023 the total expenditure on professional learning for staff was \$17245.95. Staff engaged in both free and paid professional development opportunities.

Staff receive regular professional development in the areas of ICT, data analysis, pedagogy, wellbeing, child safety and meeting the needs of students with disabilities, in addition to professional development for specialist subject areas. PD opportunities are embedded into the staff meeting schedule, as well as facilitated during external events. As such, our teachers engage in a number of professional development courses throughout the year to ensure they keep up-to-date in the fast-changing world of learning.

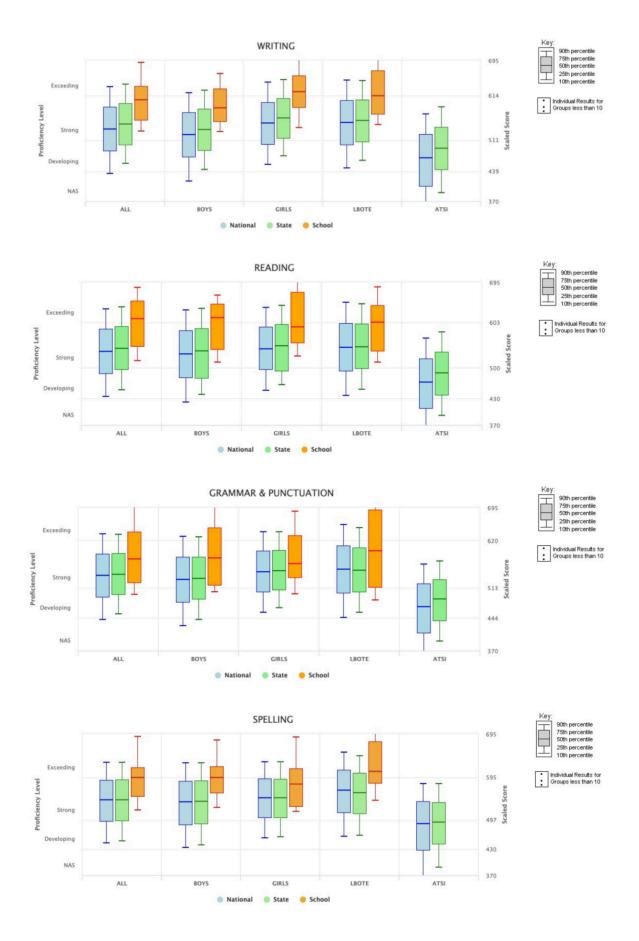
National Benchmarks

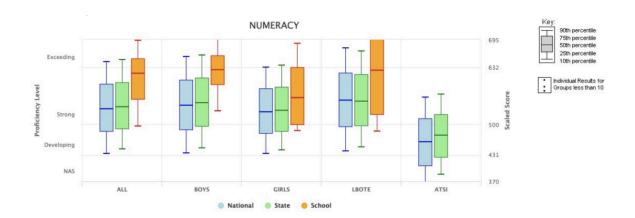

Nunawading Christian College uses both NAPLAN and PAT data to assess student progress.

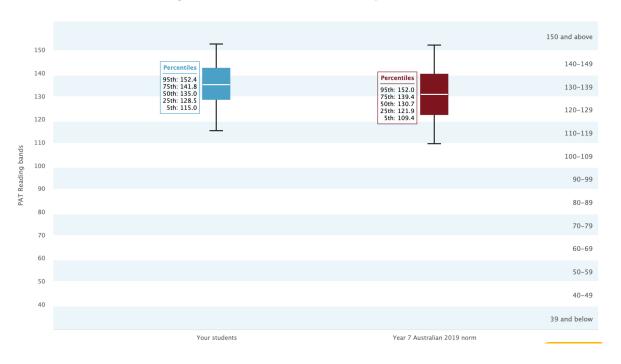

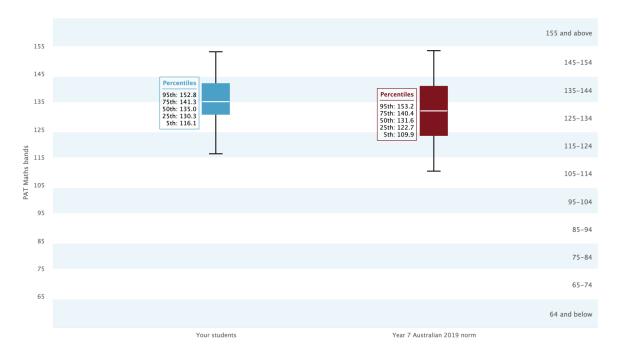
- We are above the State and National average in Writing. Our lowest percentile is
 just below the state average. Overall our girls are stronger in writing than the
 boys. When looking at the writing criteria report areas of focus where we are
 either close or below the national and state average for more than two scores
 are: ideas, character and setting, vocabulary, punctuation, spelling.
- We are above the State and National average in Grammar and Punctuation. Our lowest 25th percentile is still within the middle two bands of the State average.
- We are well above the State and National average in Reading, and our lowest percentile is within the states 25 50 percentile range.
- We are still above the State and National average in Numeracy. The majority of our students (<25th percentile) are above the state mean. We achieved above expectations for number and algebra which was the focus of Covid tutoring in 2023. We are lower than expected for measurement and geometry which wasn't focused on for Covid tutoring.





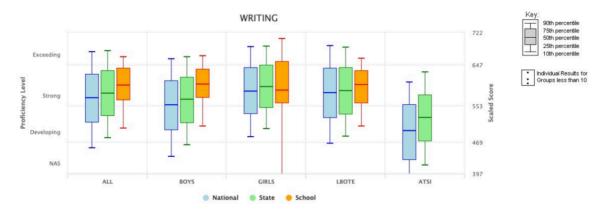

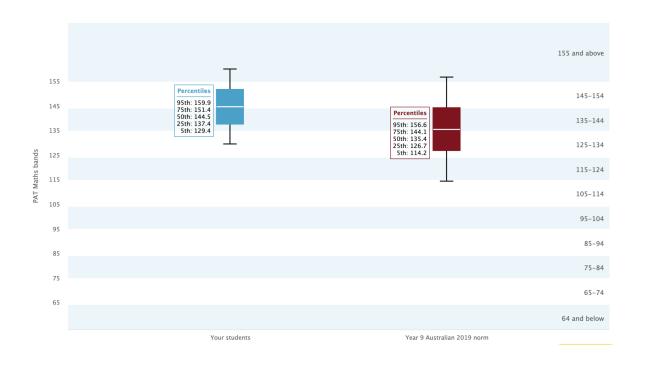
- We are above the State and National average in Writing. Areas where we scored

- We are above the State and National average in Grammar and Punctuation. 75% of our students are above the state and national averages.
- We are above the State and National average in Reading. Nearly 75% of our students are above the state and national averages.

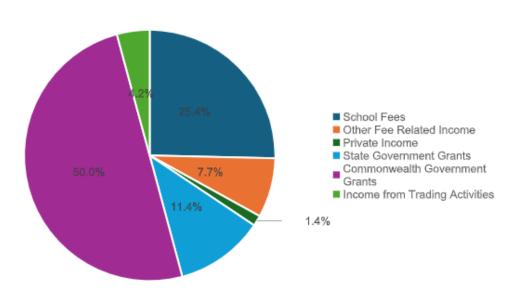

Income and Expenditure 2023

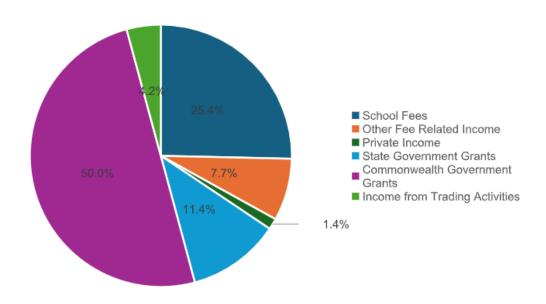
Income for 2023

Future Direction

Looking towards 2024 and beyond, we are excited about how our school has progressed this year. Facilities

During 2023, the school continued to invest in improved grounds and infrastructure.

During this period the school:

- 1. Replaced the windows and doors in 2 classrooms.
- 2. Increased security by adding fences and gates around the school
- 3. Upgraded the Multi-Purpose Center for staged events
- 4. Updated the bus fleet with additional vehicles
- 5. Added wellbeing and chaplaincy spaces in the administration building.

As the school continues to grow and achieve, we are most conscious of our obligations to provide a safe workplace and safe learning space for our staff and students. Our master plan is well established, with identified projects ready to go, depending on funding approval. These include upgrades to parking, classrooms, the assembly hall and staff facilities.
